14. Some people criticize the 2007 Conservative Government of Canada for not being environmentally friendly. On page 317, there are four pictures and explanations that refute this criticism. What are the four environmental laws and policies that the Conservative government funded or initiated? 15. Please take a look at these political cartoons and **determine the message of each**. Remember that most political cartoons are criticizing someone or something. That means they are usually sarcastic.
